

s we begin this new calendar year, we tend to forget the church year began in December with Advent and the hope for God's appearance of the Messiah. But, The Messiah did not appear as many expected. He came as a little Baby, helpless and vulnerable and dependent. That is hardly what most people expected of God. What do we expect of God? Is God a Santa Claus who fulfills all our wishes? Is God a puppet master who pulls strings to make us do what God wants? Or, is God a mighty power who exists somewhere out in the

cosmos uninterested in all our little problems and concerns? Of course, God is none of the above. God won't fulfill all our wishes nor will God pull our strings to make us dance and sing whenever God wants. And, God isn't somewhere out there in space oblivious to our problems. The Christian witness is very clear: GOD IS WITH US! But, why did God come into this world as a little baby? As Martin Luther observed in one of his Christmas sermons, we'll never understand God's good news to us unless we can answer the question, "What Child is this?" The Christmas carol asks that question, "What Child is this, who, laid to rest, On Mary's lap is sleeping?" But, the answer is veiled and obscure in the hymn, "... Good Christian, fear: for sinners here The silent Word is pleading." Maybe that's why God came into the world as a helpless and vulnerable baby. God is pleading to us to pick him up and hold him and love him. God won't force us. We have to come to the manger and kneel and embrace God as a parent would bend down and pick up their child. As the picture in this meditation shows, the Christ Child is reaching out to the Magi and inviting them to embrace him. And, the carol invites all of us, "Come, peasant, king to own Him. The King of kings salvation brings; Let loving hearts enthrone Him." Martin Luther was convinced that we would never understand the meaning of Christmas unless we knew how much God loves us or, as the hymn declares, that we "own" - completely accept - God's love and love God back. When we completely surrender all our self-centered thoughts and ways and love God without reservation, we will know who this child is. Matthew's gospel tells us that these three kings, wisemen, gave up their livelihoods to find this king that their holy books promised. He may not have been what they were expecting but, immediately, they knew who this Baby was. As the carol proclaims, "This, this is Christ, the King... Haste, haste to bring Him laud, The Babe, the Son of Mary!" They knew.

They "owned" what they were experiencing. As we join the Magi in this Epiphany Season, will we "own" this Child or will we wander away seeking another "messiah" who proclaims empty promises by telling us what we want to hear? While we Americans celebrated Christmas with joyous carols and stirring Christmas messages, maybe it would be good to reflect what Christmas was like in Bethlehem at the Lutheran Evangelical Church where, instead of a cot in a hay-filled manger, the Baby Jesus was wrapped in a black and white Palestinian keffiyeh lying among broken breeze blocks and paving slabs reminding us, as the Lutheran pastor said in his Christmas sermon, "If Jesus was born today, he'd be born under the rubble of Gaza. This is a grim reminder that God is with us even in the devastation and disaster of war or any problems we face... GOD IS WITH US!!!
