But, this was also true when Winston Churchill paraphrased Spanish philosopher, George Santyana in a 1948 speech to Parliament, "Those that fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it." history, humankind has kept repeating the chaotic patterns of history in violence, oppression, hatred, and fear. Will it ever end?

St. John in his Revelation says that the chaos will end. That's why I am hoping members of St. Timothy will consider joining our summer coffee hour Bible discussions on John's Revelation beginning in late June. This six-week discussion group will skim through the book and in the process will help participants to understand to whom John was writing and why. And, while some Christians have interpreted Revelation as an apocalyptic, end-of-the world scenario, I think John wrote his Revelation as a book of hope and renewal.

Certainly, the "Left Behind" series from the 90s and the 2014 movie had focused on the "end times" as the "Late Great Planet Earth" by Hal Lindsey in the 1970s also did. In our study and discussions, we will certainly examine that apocalyptic portion of the Revelation. I hope we'll realize that many others in history have had similar interpretations, such as Martin Luther in the midst of the Reformation and probably others during the Black Plague, the World Wars, and other catastrophic times.

But, I hope the participants in our discussions will realize that, when we consider God's story - His story, history - from Genesis to Revelation, we will understand the

Bible is not about the end of the world but about the fulfillment of God's kingdom. We all know that God created and all was good. But, we also know that, instead of living in



God's perfect garden, humankind chose to want to be like God and ate the fruit of the tree of knowledge. As a result we were separated from God's presence. The Bible is God's story of trying to get us back into that perfect relationship. John understood that and envisioned that reunion in Revelation.

These verses from Revelation 21 are John's vision of the creation of the new age. John envisioned a new holy city, a new dwelling place for God, a new Jerusalem descending from heaven, like a bride coming to meet her beloved with joy and hope and love. That's how John saw the future, not a future of war and violence and fear, but a future of love and hope and joy.

John's hope and our hope is to see God's kingdom descend into this world of chaos and turbulence, speaking into the darkness and proclaiming, "Let there be light," because where God is, there is light. And, even though we know that God's kingdom is not here yet, we do know that God's kingdom is here in the Body of Christ, now. And, we affirm that, when we confess, "I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic church, the communion of saints..." we are the Bride of Christ bringing the New Jerusalem into the darkness...

Sylvia Dow was born on September 18th, 1926 in the small town of Vilna, Canada. She was the daughter of immigrants from Eastern Europe. Her mother's family arrived in 1913 for a land grant. They were hard working farmers, living in harsh conditions.

Her father worked for the Canadian National Railroad. He laid track and later maintained the tracks. Sylvia attended a one room school house, many of the students riding their horses to school. At 13 she worked at the town store, filling orders for the farmers who came into town on Saturdays. While still a teenager she moved to Edmonton, living with her aunt and uncle. She worked at the Mayfair golf course as a pie baker and tea hostess. While working for the bureau of Vital Statistics she changed her name from Sophie to Sylvia. Mom kept busy with work and her church's young peo-

ple's group. She met her husband, Robert Dow, marrying in 1947. Times were not easy and many moves followed. In Portland they

bought a little house on Tibbetts Street. Sylvia worked 20 years for Fred Meyers as a fabric store manager. Sylvia was always able to make a friend in a new place. Retired and enjoying her friendships from church, work and Cascade Athletic Club Silver Sneakers. Her long time friend from work, Joanne, brought her to St. Timothy Church where she enjoyed many more friendships. At 94, she



left her home on Tibbetts for Powell Valley Assisted Living. This was difficult for her as she had such an independent spirit. She had friends from the past and many new ones. She enjoyed playing games and the fellowship of others. At 97 her health declined and she passed away on April 1, 2024.
